# LOCAL PLAN for Buckinghamshire

Wider Sports and Open Spaces Study July 2025



#### 1. Introduction

- 1.1. In April 2020, a new Buckinghamshire unitary council was formed. This replaced the former Buckinghamshire County Council and the former district councils of Aylesbury Vale, Chiltern, South Bucks and Wycombe. The new authority, known as Buckinghamshire Council, serves a population of just over 550,000 people across an area of almost 1,900 km2.
- 1.2. One of Buckinghamshire Council's priorities is to produce a Local Plan for Buckinghamshire (LP4B) to update and replace the former Local plans covering the council area. The new LP4B is intended to shape the direction of growth throughout the new unitary area over the next 20 years. To produce an up-to-date local plan the council needs an up-to-date evidence base. As part of this work the council has undertaken a wider sports and Open Spaces study. This study will form part of the evidence base that is necessary to ensure the LP4B will be robust and justifiable, and that it will help to shape a sustainable future for Buckinghamshire.

### 2. Purpose of Study

- 2.1. The wider Sports and Open Spaces Study records the amount of sports (for non-pitch-based sports and open spaces that currently exist to serve the council's residents. A separate Sport Playing Pitch Strategy is being produced for sports which use pitches. The aim is to provide up-to-date information on current sports and recreational infrastructure in Buckinghamshire. The information gathered will be used to inform the emerging spatial strategy for the LP4B. It will also aid development management officers in considering applications to remove sports and recreation facilities or to provide new facilities. The study will also be used by the Council's Communities' team to assess future needs for sports and recreation facilities, and or to assess possible future funding programs to improve community provision.
- 2.2. The study identifies where there are existing shortfalls in the provision of sports, recreational areas, or open spaces based on the Fields in Trust Standards. Each community has developed sports, recreational and open space facilities over the years to meet the local community's needs. However, as sports trends have changed and the population has increased in some areas there is not enough provision of the right type to meet the needs of the existing population. Future development to meet the housing and employment needs of the area is likely to require the provision of new sports, recreational or open space areas to meet the needs of the new residents.

## 3. National Planning Policy

3.1 National planning policy is set out in the National Planning Policy Framework<sup>1</sup> (NPPF) and associated Planning Practice Guidance (PPG). The NPPF states that planning should ensure provision of healthy, inclusive and safe places which offer opportunities

for social interaction and provision of local facilities to encourage healthier living.<sup>2</sup>

- 3.2 Specifically in relation to sports, recreational and open spaces the guidance states that Councils should
  - plan positively for the provision and use of shared spaces, community facilities such as sports venues and open space
  - guard against the unnecessary loss of valued facilities and services,
  - ensure that established facilities and services are able to develop and modernise, and are retained for the benefit of the community;
  - ensure an integrated approach to considering the location of housing, economic uses and community facilities and services.<sup>3</sup>
- 3.3 The NPPF has a specific section covering Open Space and Recreation, it states that 'Access to a network of high quality open spaces and opportunities for sport and physical activity is important for the health and well-being of communities and can deliver wider benefits for nature and support efforts to address climate change. Planning policies should be based on robust and up-to-date assessments of the need for open space, sport and recreation facilities (including quantitative or qualitative deficits or surpluses) and opportunities for new provision. Information gained from the assessments should be used to determine what open space, sport and recreational provision is needed, which plans should then seek to accommodate.' <sup>4</sup>
- 3.4 Therefore, it is clear from the guidance that the council needs to undertake a full assessment of all the existing open space sites and recreational facilities to inform the Local plan for Buckinghamshire.

## 4. Open space and recreational studies

4.1 Buckinghamshire Council has already undertaken an indoor sports facilities study and as such it needs to undertake an analysis of outdoor sports facilities. Sport England has produced guidance on the assessment of outdoor sports facilities and in particular playing pitch strategies. Playing pitch strategy guidance has been produced by Sport England with the assistance of some of the main pitch-based sports. Playing pitch strategies are therefore a way of assessing pitch-based sports with the involvement of Sport England and the relevant sport's governing bodies which gives an approved study additional weight. It has therefore

been decided to undertake a Playing pitch strategy (PPS) for the main pitch-based sports. The Playing Pitch Strategy is therefore subject to a separate assessment and report timeframe. This study covers those sports and open spaces that are not included in the PPS work, and it is intended that this study will form a separate but complementary study of other open space and outdoor sports facilities. Taken together the indoor sports facilities study, the Playing Pitch Strategy and this study will provide the council with an up-to-date understanding of sports and open recreational space provision across the county area.

- 4.2 Wider Sports facilities and recreational open spaces are provided by a variety of organisations. For example, a recreation ground may be provided by a council (parish or County), or an informal recreational space may be provided by a housing provider or run by a local community association.
- 4.3 Sports facilities and recreational open spaces generally serve the immediate population, for example a local recreation area will serve the population of the area where it is located. Other facilities or open spaces may serve a wider area because of the location of the facility or the specific type of sport facilities being provided. This mix of provision can make it difficult to plan for and or assess the precise open space and or wider sports needs across the council area.
- 4.4 As explained above, wider sports and open space uses can include many types of areas and sizes of provision. Many recreational or wider sports sites are associated with other community use buildings and many types of uses; For clarity community use buildings will be covered by the community facilities study.
- 4.5 Due to the mix of community type uses and the use of sports facilities by community groups other than sports teams, this means there will be some overlap between the uses covered by this study and the other studies mentioned. To aid understanding of what type of facility is covered by which study appendix A lists the types of community/sport/open space use and the study that they are covered by. The overlap of uses means that in some cases the studies may need to be used together to assess provision.

## 5. Wider sports and open spaces study purposes

5.1 The Wider Sports and Open Spaces Study has five key functions.

To:

- Inform policies (including site allocation policies) in the emerging Local Plan
- Help update and corroborate the settlement hierarchy for the emerging Local Plan
- Be a point of reference for planning applications that propose the loss, gain or alteration of a sports facility and or an open space
- Be a point of reference for planning applications for development sites that consider or propose inclusion of new wider sports facilities or open spaces.
- Provide evidence for consideration of CIL and S106 applications.
- 5.2 National planning guidance states that existing open space, sports and recreational buildings and land, including playing fields and formal play spaces, should not be built on unless:

  a) an assessment has been undertaken which has clearly shown the open space, buildings

or land to be surplus to requirements; or

- b) the loss resulting from the proposed development would be replaced by equivalent or better provision in terms of quantity and quality in a suitable location; or
- c) the development is for alternative sports and recreational provision, the benefits of which clearly outweigh the loss of the current or former use.

This study helps to provide the council with evidence of the amount and type of wider sports facilities and open spaces that exist and so helps to inform the policies in the local plan for Buckinghamshire.

- 5.3 As explained below, this study builds on the evidence collected for the settlement review to help establish a settlement hierarchy for the local plan.
- 5.4 Having an up-to-date evidence study of the sports facilities and open spaces throughout the council area can help planning officers assess planning applications that may propose the loss of existing sports facilities or open spaces and the provision of new sports facilities or open spaces. It can also be used in considering proposals for alterations to an existing sports facility or open space. The study can be used as evidence where planning applications for larger developments include the provision of new sports facilities or open spaces as part of the wider development proposals.
- 5.5 Community Infrastructure funding or section 106 money could be used to improve existing facilities, provide more capacity for existing facilities or be channeled towards the provision of new facilities where the respective councils consider this is an area to spend their allocated Community Infrastructure funding.

## 6. Methodology

- 6.1 It was decided that information about community services across Buckinghamshire had already been gathered by work undertaken during the council's Buckinghamshire Settlement review study as such it was considered that data gathered by the settlement review work could act as a reference point and that the wider sports and open spaces study could build on this initial data source.
- 6.2 The Buckinghamshire settlement review methodology was based on a four-stage process. Firstly, a preliminary list of settlements to be covered by the review was defined. These were settlements with a population of over 100.
- 6.3 Secondly a desktop study was undertaken to gather information on facilities and services as well as public transport provision in the identified settlements.
- 6.4 Services and facilities were split into key and non-key service and facilities. Key services are those considered the most important in supporting local residents to meet their needs. Non-key services are those which also help to meet needs but are less important on a day-to-day basis and which, because they require larger populations to support them, tend to be found in larger settlements.
- 6.5 The desk top study was supplemented by a direct approach to the 171 Town and parish councils in Buckinghamshire. This asked them to review the data collected and to add to or amend it as necessary. This was done using a questionnaire, which was sent out in December 2022.
- 6.6 The survey approach does lead to some limitations as to the quality of the data. Some data

was provided on a parish basis and some more focused on individual settlements whilst the settlement study was focused on individual settlements the wider sports and open spaces study was looking at parish based information. Finally, many of the indicators used in the study reflect services and facilities which are liable to change over time, for example shops and pubs are constantly opening and closing, and bus timetables change regularly. It is therefore important to regard this survey as a 'snapshot' of the situation in early 2023, updated in 2025

- 6.7 Following a review a decision was taken to raise the population threshold to include only settlements of 500 people or more.
- 6.8 Following the questionnaire survey, a further desktop study took place to update the data held for those parish/ town councils and meetings which had not responded.
- 6.9 Further stages of the settlement study related to setting a settlement hierarchy and are not directly applicable to the wider sports and open spaces study.
- 6.10 In early 2025 all parishes were re-contacted as part of a wider data-gathering exercise and asked for any updates to the data originally provided for the Settlement Review. A copy of the email text is attached at Appendix B. An assumption was made that where parishes did not respond, the data already held from the previous assessment was correct. The results from the survey and data already held on Wider sports and open spaces is set out in Appendix C.

#### 7. Summary and conclusions

- 7.1 The wider sports facilities and open spaces study can only present a partial picture of the sports and open spaces available to the community across Buckinghamshire. To gain a full picture particularly of the provision of sports facilities this study will need to be assessed alongside the work already undertaken on indoor sports facilities across the council area. This work is still progressing to assess those sports who require marked out pitches.
- 7.2 The coverage of recreational open spaces is very mixed across the council area, generally the larger settlements have more provision, however there are a lot of smaller settlements that have no recreational open space at all. In the existing established settlements, there can be many reasons, often historical, why some settlements have provision of open spaces and other wider sports facilities and others have none.
- 7.3 Whilst knowing the amount of wider sports facilities and open spaces will be helpful for future planning both in terms of the provision of new facilities, but also in terms of seeking to protect existing community use of the facilities, it is clear that the council will need to gather more information about the facilities particularly open spaces such as the curtilage of the space and the split of uses, children's play areas can be designed to serve a whole community or may be provided to serve part of an area such as one housing estate. Newer communities often on a larger scale can have tiers of play space provision from the local neighbourhood through to serving the whole development. Whilst it's unlikely such a tier of provision will be created across existing developments and understanding of the size and scale of provision would allow people to consider additional provision where there is a lack of existing facilities. This enhanced level of understanding may come via further specific

community surveys; evidence produced through the planning application process or through work undertaken for neighbourhood plans.

#### 8. Review

8.1 The council is aware that any survey of facilities will only be correct at the point the survey is undertaken. The result is that the study results will become out of date over time as different sports facilities or open spaces are created or existing areas change their use or become unused. The council is keen to keep the information it holds up to date this will ensure that both the council has up-to-date evidence for the local plan but also has an up-to-date picture when assessing the need for existing wider sports facilities or open spaces to be protected or for additional facilities/areas to be provided. Therefore, the council intends to review the Wider sports facilities and open spaces study on an annual basis with a re-survey of parishes which may over time include additional questions to add detail to the wider sports facility and open spaces information held.
